Time to look back for our future

The passenger tapped the taxi driver on the shoulder to ask him something. The driver screamed, lost control of the vehicle, nearly hit a bus, went up on the pavement, and stopped inches from a shop window. For a



second everything went quiet in the taxi, then the driver said,

"Please sir, don't ever do that again. You scared me half to death!"
The passenger, wide-eyed and pleased to be alive, apologized and said he didn't realize that a little tap would cause such a response. The driver replied, "You're right. I'm sorry. Really, it's not your fault. Today is my first day as a taxi driver. I've been driving a hearse for 25 years."

It is, of course, a very silly story. The point of it is that the taxi driver allowed his past experiences to cause him to take his eye off of the road and his goal of getting his passenger to his destination.

Sometimes we allow our past to affect our present and future also. Events from our past can cast a shadow over our present, and make us anxious for the future. Mistakes or sins we have committed in the past can leave us unsure as to whether God could really love us, leading us to keep him at arm's length as we move forward with life.

Sometimes we allow our past to affect our present and future also. Yet there is also good reason to look back – not to our own past – but beyond, 2,000 years or so, to the experience of another person, Christ Jesus.

Lent is the six-week period leading up to Easter. It's one of the most important times of year for many Christians around the world, particularly those within the Anglican, Catholic and Orthodox traditions, held at a similar level of importance to Advent – the build up to Christmas.

While Advent is a celebration and a time of great anticipation, Lent is more frequently seen as a time of solemn observance and preparation for the celebration of the death and resurrection of Jesus at Easter. Lent invites us to pause, ponder and prepare our hearts and minds in readiness to remember Jesus' life, death and body resurrection, and all that achieved; which is truly life-changing. As the Apostle Paul writes to the Ephesian church,



"But God's mercy is so abundant, and his love for us is so great, that while we were spiritually dead in our disobedience he brought us to life with Christ. It is by God's grace that you have been saved." (Ephesians 2:4-5 GNT)

When we find our past casting a shadow over our lives in a negative way, we need to learn how to deal with those things in light of God's love and goodness.

When guilt from former mistakes or sins, cause us to think that God would not be interested in us, we need to deal with them in light of God's grace and forgiveness.

Why not join us at one of our services – perhaps over Easter – to hear more of this incredible news, as we look back to the one who came to bring forgiveness and a sure and certain hope. You would be most welcome.

The Church of the Holy Spirit – Milton Combe

The condition of the roof of The Church of the Holy Spirit at Milton Combe has become very poor in

various places requiring remedial work to replace damaged slates, lead gutterings, valleys and flashings. Internally repair of the ceiling plaster is also required in several areas. Some roof timbers and battens also need replacing. Quoted costs for the repair work are high because of the listed building status and the presence of bats which have to be protected during any work. In addition to the roof repairs the heating system within the church needs upgrading with the possibility of installing solar panels. The total sum required for the proposed works is £50,000.

Monthly activities have been arranged to help towards the global total in addition to applications to various charitable trusts. Support from friends and local village residents for these events will be greatly appreciated. Bookings will be made through Eventbrite.

Tower Clock at St Andrew's Church, Buckland Monachorum

Introduction

Many residents in Buckland Monachorum felt quite upset when the Church Clock stopped working earlier in 2023. The regular chiming of the hours was no longer heard and the hands on the recently restored clock face remained stationary. St Andrew's Church and its clock are seen as such important features of the village. Life in the village seemed rather incomplete without the cherished clock in full working order. For some time, it appeared that time had stood still at either 12 noon or 12 midnight!



History

The Church Clock was originally installed in 1906 by John Smith and Sons of the Midland Clock Works based in Derby and is described as a flatbed, strike clock. At the turn of the 19th century, the Parishioners and friends of Rev. Richard Hayne were instrumental in raising funds to restore and rehang the bells in the church tower which call the congregation to worship and also to provide and install the church clock. Richard Hayne had been Vicar of St Andrews for a very impressive 50 years!



Other clocks made and installed by John Smith and Sons include the cathedral clock at St Paul's Cathedral in London (1898), and the Town Hall clock in Grampound, Cornwall (1894).

Recent repairs

For several years the clock in the tower at St Andrew's had been serviced and maintained by Smith of Derby, the firm originally established by John Smith in 1856. Last year it was noted that various parts of the clock mechanism had become worn, in particular with excessive wear of several of the bearings on the going train, thus making the clock more difficult to service. Despite regular servicing the clock

stopped working completely in April last year. Significant repairs were needed and some of the estimates obtained, including that from Smith of Derby seemed very expensive.

However, a more reasonable quotation for repair was obtained from a local firm, South Hams Clock Servicing. Following extensive repairs by their engineer, Rob van Es, the clock is now in good working order, chiming each hour as before.

It was particularly pleasing that the clock was able to chime in the New Year, always appreciated and especially by those gathered in the village to see out the old and welcome in the new.



We are most grateful to Stephen Fryer for overseeing the repairs to the clock. As he has for many years, he continues to wind the clock on a regular basis, adjusting it to ensure that it keeps good time and thus providing a much-appreciated service to the local community.

For the future

We have a two-year guarantee from the South Hams Clock Company who will now continue to service the clock. We hope and pray that we will have a functioning clock for the foreseeable future. However eventually it may be that at some stage the mechanism is no longer serviceable and a complete rebuild or even a new clock may be required.

The tower at St Andrew's continues to attract many visitors when it is opened each year during the Buckland Monachorum June Fair. In addition to viewing the bell-ringing chamber and enjoying the splendid view from the top of the tower, visitors can also see the mechanism of a beautiful clock now almost 120 years old, working well and keeping good time.

INTERNET NEWS

Well here we are at the start of another year and there's so much to talk about. Artificial Intelligence (AI) is being talked about everywhere it seems but what does it mean for the likes of you and me? I hear that your vacuum cleaner will soon 'know' all about your floors and set itself accordingly, and AI fridges will be ordering your usual items before they run out. Yikes! Fraudsters will, of course, be using AI to create more sophisticated scams, while security companies will be using it to defeat said scams.

Please, please remember to put the phone down on any 'out of the blue' phone calls, no matter what. I heard of someone who 'lost' £20k+ before Christmas with a 'your accounts are under attack and you need to move your money' scam which has been doing the rounds for quite a while, thankfully they were refunded.

Amazon have been targeted with their 'unique delivery code' system, where the courier demands a code (sent by Amazon) before handing over the parcel. You then get the parcel, only to find it is empty, or has dog food or similar inside, because someone has pinched the contents. But of course, you've now accepted the parcel.

What would you do if you found you'd had a parcel delivered you weren't expecting, and then found the courier had come back saying the parcel had been wrongly delivered? Would you hand it over? Well don't. Someone could

have ordered a phone using your address. It is sent to you unexpectedly and you return it to the 'courier', then sometime later you are chased for payment. Never hand over the parcel, open it and contact the sender first. Make a note of all calls etc if making a return to the sender. Also check your bank account for unusual payments.

Two factor authentication (2FA) is becoming more usual now. Even logging into Google on a new laptop/phone needs the OK from another device you use first. It is a 'must' that you regularly check your settings in accounts (such as Google). Is your recovery phone number correct? It should definitely be a mobile number as you will be sent a code by text message. Do you have an alternative email address set up as well, so that you can unlock your phone or tablet if you forget the password or pin? This can be as easy as using your partner's (or sensible child's) email address. And of course regularly change your password. I covered creating passwords way back in August 2020 and you can read the article on www.bucklandcomputers.com/weblog.

Finally; if you ring the shop phone number you won't, for some reason, here a ringing tone while waiting for me to pick up. No idea why. The phone is re-routed to my mobile when I'm not there so it's a good number to ring as it will usually find me.

The Case for Little Wins

I am of an age when I remember when Britain didn't have many Olympic successes or score highly in the medal table. I remember when we cheered along only a few 'big names' in athletes like Daley Thompson or couldn't believe we actually had two excellent middle distance runners in Steve Ovett and Sebastian Coe competing in the same race. For goodness sake, in Atlanta 1996 we won only a single Gold Medal and came 36th in the medal table behind Kazakhstan. Then came along David Brailsford and his vision for the British Cycling Team. (There was also National Lottery funding and other strategies as well but I am going to concentrate on this one).



Sir David is well known for his concept of 'marginal gains' or in other words 'the one percent margin for improvement in everything you do'. They may be small but when they are added up together they lead to remarkable improvements. This was adopted by the cycling team and by the 2000 Olympics they were seeing impressive results with people like Bradley Wiggins and Chris Hoy becoming household names. Fast forward to the 2012 Olympics and need I say more... Now I am not saying we have to all become Olympic cyclists or enter any other sport at a competitive level, but the principle can be applied by everyone, everywhere in their daily lives.

Most of us would have heard of the acronym SMART in terms of goal setting.
- Specific - Measurable - Achievable - Realistic - Timely

Well what is more achievable than a small specific change? You want some ideas? There are podcasts, articles and courses to go on. Go for the ideas that spark something in you and are reliably backed up with science (celebrity endorsed money making schemes are to be avoided!) Changes, when repeated over and over become habits and habits, as the saying goes, last a lifetime. Tiny modifications to our behaviour or our thoughts in areas such as our food, sleep and movement will go a long way to making 2024 a healthier and happier year. So give it a try and be amazed by the results.

The Nightingales' team is made up of 5 dedicated volunteers in Milton Combe plus a Ukrainian refugee, who lived in the village for a year before moving to Plymouth: Denise Ullmann a senior paediatric consultant; Anton Horwich, a retired marketing manager and local businessman; Dr Rupert Jones, a retired GP and medical researcher; Tracey Halton, a retired neo-natal intensive care nurse, Dan Halton, a qualified mechanic with experience in transport and logistics and Olena Vorona,



who provides a vital link to the local Ukrainian community and to the relevant medical teams and authorities in Ukraine.



During one of their recent aid trips, Dr Denise Ullmann and Dr Rupert Jones visited the Malyatko Children's Rehabilitation Centre in Uzhhorod, western Ukraine just as a group of children from the Kharkiv area arrived for a fortnight's respite from the war. "It was a moving and sobering experience," says Denise.

"We are immensely grateful to the Buckland Monachorum community for funding the purchase of one of our 4x4s, which has already gone to Ukraine and we are constantly refining our operation with each trip. We are now only sourcing **long wheelbase** 4x4s, as these are able to carry a stretcher with an injured soldier," says Dan Halton. "It costs £5000-£6000 to purchase a suitable vehicle, fill it with aid and drive it to Ukraine and we are always in need of additional funds." Nightingales UK has already held several fundraising events and the recent "Dance for Ukraine" day held in Princetown raised a staggering £6000!

Nightingales UK already has promised funding to buy the next 4x4 vehicle but urgently needs further funds to purchase medical aid. It is happy to make presentations to local societies and groups and is planning a number of fundraising events. Groups interested in hosting a presentation should email nightingalesuk@gmail.com

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

"Archaeological discoveries at Sherford"- a talk by Stephen Reed

Stephen's talk took us through the amazing discoveries that have been made at the Sherford development, east of Plymouth where archaeologists have conducted geo-physical surveys looking for anomalies in the landscape such as ditches, pits and walls.

Early finds were of late Mesolithic hunter-gatherer flint tools and Neolithic pottery bowls with decorations made with bird feathers. Numerous post holes suggested Bronze Age roundhouses and rare examples of large earthen barrows yielded cremation cemeteries. A large pile of stones when cleared revealing a kistvaen (burial chamber) with an upturned urn and found to contain human bones and a copper knife. After expert analysis these were thought to be from a Bronze Age man aged between 35-45 with disc degeneration.

Maps created by the surveys showed a well-made but disappearing trackway, covered with shale dug out from old side quarries, a possible Roman road – maybe a military supply route. Ancient stone querns used for grinding grain were also found. A wet area contained burnt stone in the shape of troughs. It's thought that these were for heating water, cooking, washing clothes and textiles, brewing, rituals, or even ancient saunas.

In 2022 came the most important and astonishing discoveries for perhaps a century or more. In an area of limestone a sinkhole revealed an underground cavern which brought work to a halt. The subsequent excavations revealed over 200 clusters of extinct megafauna bones dating back to the last Ice Age 35-60,000 years ago. They include woolly mammoth, woolly rhinoceros, wolf, hyena, horse, reindeer, mountain hare and red fox, as well as bats and shrews. It is thought that some of the creatures fell into a pit and were unable to escape, and carnivorous scavengers followed and met a similar fate - or the animals died elsewhere and the bones washed into the area over a period of time. The archaeological team have carried out environmental sampling and removed the bones for detailed analysis and recording. It is hoped that the bones will eventually be displayed in the Plymouth Box Museum.

The underground space has been conserved; no construction will take place on top of it. Though the entrance will be closed to protect the historic site and ensure public safety. Stephen's hopes were that perhaps eventually some suitable memorial and information space could be made available near the site.

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A Missionary's South Pacific island life in the 1880s

"We are so sorry about the Queen," said the Polynesian man. "You see we were British once . Inside we still are!" We had just arrived in French Polynesia on September 9th with the aim of finding the grave of William Richards, a missionary working for the London Missionary Society, who was the husband of my Great Grand Aunt Libbie Wragg.

The difficult political situation in the late 1880s was the backdrop to William's life and work on the Society islands of Raiatea, Tahaa, Bora Bora and Maupiti. Formerly claimed by Britain (Captain Cook), France now wanted to take the group over, but the islanders wanted to remain under the British Protectorate.

Libbie, aged 21, had left England for Australia with £5 sewn into the hem of her skirt (just in case). She had not seen her fiancée for 3 years since he had been ordained, but they were married the day after she arrived and a couple of weeks later set off for Raiatea.

Travel to and from his churches and schools was by boat or pirogue which could take hours or many days if he was visiting another island group. William suffered with sea sickness and also T.B. For a couple of years William worked hard to keep his mission churches and schools going and also trained native theological students. Libbie worked beside him teaching until their son Aroma (named by the islanders) was born. A thousand people attended Aromas baptism at Williams main church on Raiatea.

In March 1888 the French fed up with passive tactics to get the people to accept French rule issued an ultimatum. William got in his boat and after two hours reached the rebels in their valley hideout and managed to turn their war council into a prayer meeting. He was desperate to avoid bloodshed. His contribution as peacemaker was commended by both the L.M.S. and the French Government.

In August 1888 a boatload of islanders from Rurutu, 432 miles away, arrived asking William to bless their newly built church. Returning a month later he succumbed to exhaustion and his tuberculosis. Three days later he died aged just 32.

It took us three days but eventually we found his grave halfway up the mountain above his church. All Williams churches are still there and his legacy lives on in the generations of lives he saved.
